When people ask my son Rylan why he's in a wheelchair, he likes to say he broke his pinky. And when anyone asks why he wears a mask, he says he's a ninja in training.

The hardest question came from my daughter Jenna: "How long can Rylan live until he gets his new heart?"

"I don't know," I responded, "but that heart will come. It will come."

My 10-year-old boy needs a heart transplant.

The American Heart Association has funded more cardiovascular research than any organization outside the federal government. It's funded research by 13 Nobel Prize winners and been part of many groundbreaking discoveries that could help Rylan, including advancements in heart transplantation.
